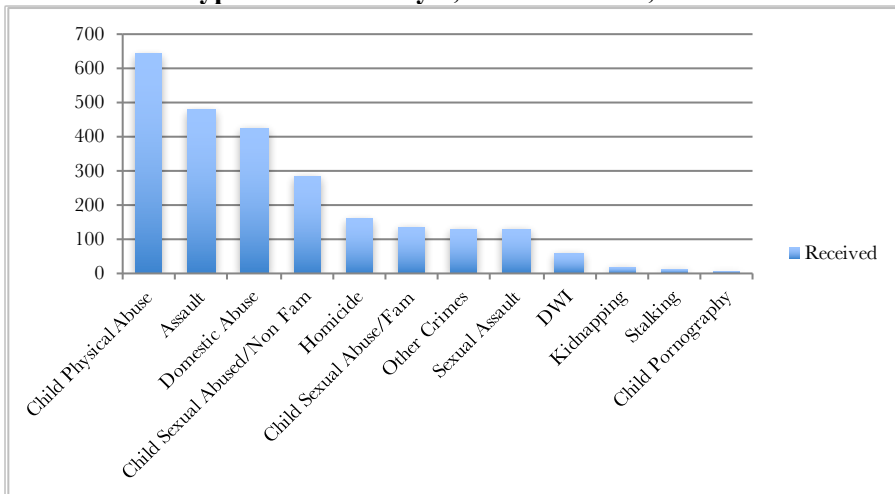
Our primary mission is to provide financial assistance to victims of violent crime in regard to expenses incurred as a result of being victimized. In addition, CVRC also administers federal flow-through funding from the United States Department of Justice. This funding is sub-granted to private non-profit and governmental programs throughout the State of New Mexico.

Reaching and achieving new heights takes vision and perseverance, two qualities embodied everyday by New Mexico crime victims. Like the victims we have assisted, we too are reaching for new heights in the way we continue to serve them. Currently, our office is working on updating our software to simplify the application process and grant administration to utilize less paper. This will allow the Compensation Program to process applications more quickly, reducing the time that victims must wait to receive much needed financial assistance; in addition to streamlining our grant administration process. We also created Priority Processing for victims of homicide to get funeral expenses covered within 72 hours. In addition, we began our Immediate Rent-Relocation Assistance (IRRA) to support victims of human trafficking, sexual assault and domestic violence to relocate to safe and secure new homes.

Last year our agency received 2629 applications and awarded \$2,007,353 in compensation on behalf of victims. We also distributed \$7,646,546 in grants to nonprofit and public organizations that provide emergency shelter, crisis counseling, court accompaniment, and assistance in completing compensation applications, among other services.

As our agency moves forward, our greatest challenge will be to ensure that victims have the tools they need to rise beyond their victimization. By continuing to create programs that are responsive to the multiple needs of the victims and the organizations that serve them we will meet that challenge.

Purpose: The primary purpose of the VOCA Victim Assistance grant is to provide services to victims of crime throughout the state. These funds support state, local, tribal and non-profit victim services organizations.

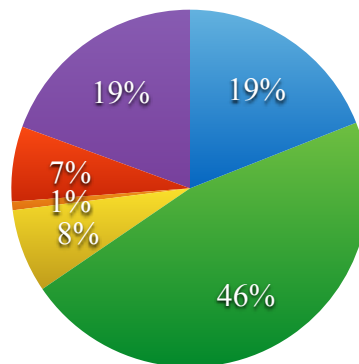
Source of Funding: Federal Flow-Through Funds

Range of Awards: \$6,245 to \$207,886

Statistics: 97 VOCA Victim Assistance projects provide services to victims of crimes. Awards to projects that provide services to Indian Country consisted of 5%. Projects providing services to underserved and marginalized populations consisted of 10.7%.

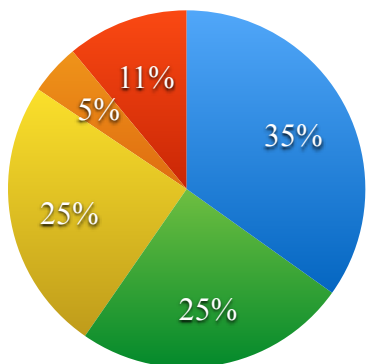

STOP Violence Against Women Act Grant

Purpose: The primary purpose of the STOP VAWA Formula Grant Program is to support communities in their efforts to develop and strengthen effective law enforcement and prosecution strategies to combat intimate partner related violent crimes and to develop and strengthen victim services in cases involving domestic, sexual, stalking and dating violence.

Source of Funding: Federal Flow-Through Funds

Range of Awards: \$5,181 to \$69,676

Statistics: 39 STOP funded projects provide services across the State. Awards to projects that provide services to Indian Country consisted of 22%. Projects providing services to underserved and marginalized populations consisted of 39%.

Sexual Assault Services Program Grant

Purpose: The primary purpose of SASP funds are to support intervention, advocacy, accompaniment, support services and related assistance impacting adult, youth and child victims of sexual assault, family and household members of victims and those collaterally affected by the victimization in New Mexico.

Source of Funding: Federal Flow-Through Funds

Range of Awards: \$19,423 to \$32,061

Statistics: 10 SASP funded projects totaling \$285,422.00 provided services to adult and child victims of sexual assault. Awards to projects that provide services to Indian Country consisted of 7%. Projects providing services to underserved and marginalized populations consisted of 16.8%.
